## Introduction

In this sermon we get an overview of The Creation Project and an overview of the doctrine of creation.

- 1) A brief explanation of The Creation Project What is it and why are we doing it?
  - a) Some context
  - b) The Creation Project is not... an attack, an agenda, easy, or unimportant.
  - c) The Creation Project is... an intellectual, pastoral, missional, and personal project.
- 2) The Doctrine of Creation involves not one question but four questions!

Science only asks the "how" question, but Christianity also asks "who," "what," and "why."

Science asks physical questions (cause and effect), the church adds metaphysical (nature and purpose).

3) The full doctrine of creation understands that Genesis 1-2 is looking both backward and forward!

Genesis 1-2 is the Bibles' prologue (take-off), and Rev 21-22 is the Bible's epilogue (landing).

## **Sunday Text Questions for Genesis 1:1-2:3 (Creation Matters series)**

April 8, 2018 Pastor Mickey Klink

- 1) Starter Question: What comes to mind when you hear the phrase: "the doctrine of creation?"
- 2) Read the text aloud and discuss together any significant observations or issues needing clarification.
- 3) How might the phrase "the earth was without form and void" in 1:2 not merely serve as a description of what happened at the beginning of creation, but be a forward-looking statement that sets up the ongoing and developing work of God in the cultivation of creation? Compare the command to be "gardeners" and to cultivate creation in 1:28.
- 4) Read Genesis 9:8-17 and Deuteronomy 32:10-11, where God places a covenant-making symbol over that which he claims and promises. How is the "hovering" Spirit of God in 1:2 also a covenant-making symbolic act by God, and what might it signify in regard to claims and promises regarding creation?
- 5) Read Revelation 21:1-3. How might the formation of creation in 1:3-25 not simply be for humanity but for God himself? How did this process get further developed at the coming of Jesus, the Immanuel?
- 6) Read Exodus 28:1-5. How do the priestly garments described in Exodus 28 help explain the significance of the robing of humanity in the "image of God?" How is humanity to serve God as "priests of creation," and what does that look like?
- 7) Read Hebrews 4:8-11. In connection with Hebrews 4:8-11, how is "Sabbath" in 2:1-3 not simply about a past "day," but about God, our covenantal identity in God, and the nature of life itself?
- 8) How is the doctrine of creation not simply about origins/beginnings (how), but also about nature and purpose (who, what, and why)?
- 9) Why do Christians focus so strongly on the "how" of the doctrine of creation and not as much (if at all) on the "who," the "what," and "the why?"
- 10) How is creation not a debate but the God-designed and purpose-filled physical world in which we live?
